Based on 2010 US Census data, 13.6% of Johnston Co. residents were over 65 yrs. old.




Approximately 39% of NC residents over 60 live in rural areas.



Proud 2021 Accomplishments:



CSS provides support for the operation of 127 independent living apartments. These are available for persons 62 and over with limited occupancy for those who are disabled and under 62. All applicants undergo credit and criminal checks. 127 units are subsidized rentals and must meet qualifying criteria.

In 2021, there were 350 volunteers needed to deliver meals to the homebound.

The Family Caregiver Program provided 1975 hours of Respite Care.

there was a pool of over 300 volunteers needed to deliver 67,385 home delivered meals.

The In-Home Aide Program provided 6,863 hours of service with 3 levels of care.

We delivered 34 donated turkeys and 15 boxes of shelf-stable food to the homebound and isolated.

125 house fans were distributed for free heat relief.


25 Emergency Preparedness Kits/Bags were given out to Caregivers in our community.

State Monitoring Results - Overall monitoring results for 2021 were very good. Triangle J Area Agency on Aging, under the state guidelines, oversee this monitoring.

Sanitation Grades - The six Senior Nutrition sites are inspected quarterly and continue to maintain a sanitation grade of 100.

Caregiver Retreat - This has become an annual event, usually held in April. Caregivers are given the opportunity to spend a relaxing day to unwind and revitalize. They receive training and education from informative and inspirational presenters, along with lunch, music, and entertainment. This retreat was cancelled due to the pandemic.

Candlelight Reflections - A candlelight ceremony is held in the Atrium of the Johnston County Courthouse the first Thursday evening in November. Candles are lit in memory or honor of a loved one. Previous speakers included Judge Joy Jones, Cullen Browder, & NC Rep. Donna White. The 2021 guest speaker was Pastor Billie Lawson.

Options Counseling - This is our seventh year helping individuals consider a range of possibilities when needing to make decisions about long-term services and supports in planning for future needs, taking into consideration their situation, desires, values, resources, and preferences. During the fiscal year, Options Counseling transferred from Simone Sawicki, due to her retirement, to Jenni Edwards.

Official Counseling Site - CSS continues to be Johnston County's official counseling site for SHIIP (Senior Health Insurance Information Program).

Even though all three of our Centers for Active Aging being closed since March 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic, our Centers for Active Aging reopened for

reopened for outdoor activities in May 2021, limited indoor activities in

June 2021, and fully reopened to all indoor classes in July 2021. While the centers were closed from March 2020 to June 2021, staff remained hard at work by delivering meals, leading virtual programs, and performing wellness checks on participants.

The Benson Center for Active Aging:

- ◆ Assisted in the Town of Benson's Town-Wide Clean-Up.
- Organized a trip of 38 participants to the Ark Encounter in Kentucky.
- Began a Tech Training class for seniors to get assistance with phones, computers, or other technology.

The Clayton Center for Active Aging:

- Partnered with the Town of Clayton's Hocutt-Ellington Library to offer virtual crafts via Zoom and indoor crafts once the center reopened.
- Held outdoor activities, including crafts and bingo.
- ♦ Hosted two Facebook Live events, which reached 463 people.

The Harrison Center for Active Aging:

- ◆ Held 39 exercise classes, including Dance Cardio and Chair Exercise, on Facebook Live, which reached 2,907 people.

- Hosted several outdoor events, including bingo, chair ball, and a Mother's Day Celebration.
- Organized Go Groups, including a trip to Meadow Lights and the New Bern Flotilla.
- Recertified as a Center of Excellence in May.

Seniors' Health Insurance Information Program (SHIIP)

- ◆ In 2021, Medicare beneficiaries in Johnston County had the opportunity to meet with a certified SHIIP counselor, either by phone, Zoom, or in person, to enroll in a Medicare plan or review their current Medicare coverage and make plan changes that could lower their costs.
- ♦ A total savings of nearly \$37,000 was garnered by the 119 individuals that received SHIIP counseling services.
- ♦ In 2021, Johnston County SHIIP fostered partnerships with the Church at Clayton Crossings and Hocutt-Ellington Memorial Library to expand outreach opportunities.
- ◆ Partnered with the Centers for Active Aging to host appointments onsite at the centers.



BCAA and other centers hosted appointments for those in need of counseling concerning **S.H.I.I.P.** (Senior Health Insurance Information Program).

Options Counseling was also available through appointments. This aids persons to make decisions about long-term services and future needs.

HCAA and other centers hosted appointments that were arranged through **Legal Aid of North Carolina**. This made it possible to handle timely arrangements over legal matters while also having room to feel comfortable while social distancing.
